## **DIRECTORY**

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- 1915(i)** The 1915i Benefit Services are available to assist individuals by ensuring that the services and supports they need are provided in the right setting to meet their individual needs.
- a) There are two types of 1915i Benefit Services:
    - A) Home Based Habilitation Services are provided to an individual who needs assistance with activities for daily living, essentially to help them establish the skills necessary to live successfully and comfortably in a home or community-based setting. These services can include recovery support, assistance in obtaining transportation, skill development on home maintenance, money management and various educational supports for other daily activities.
    - B) Behavioral Habitation Services are designed to assist an individual in attaining or maintaining their maximum level of independence. These services can include behavior support, training and education or activity therapy.

**A&D** Alcohol and Drug is the old term for what is now categorized and referred to as Substance Use Disorder (SUD) services.

**Aid & Assist** Legal classification (ORS 161.370) when an individual is arrested in the criminal justice system and they need further evaluation (aid and assistance) to participate in their legal process. Their defense attorney requests the court to send them to the state hospital for stabilization.

**ABAD** Aid to the Blind and Aid to Disabled – An Oregon Health Plan rate group.

**ABH** Adult Behavioral Health (includes mental health and substance use treatment) programs include outpatient services for individuals with mental and emotional disturbances, various substance use disorder treatments, treatment for the severely and persistently mentally ill, and 24-hour crisis services. Yamhill County Adult Behavioral Health operates clinical service centers located in McMinnville and Newberg.

**ACA** Affordable Care Act, a shortened name for the federal legislation titled Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA). The intent of the ACA is to make healthcare coverage available to all, regardless of whether they have pre-existing health conditions, at an affordable cost. In Oregon, this also expanded the Medicaid program for people whose Modified Adjusted Gross Incomes (MAGIs) are no more than 138% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and with no maximum asset levels. – An Oregon Health Plan rate group

**ACCBO** Addiction Certification Board of Oregon (now MHACBO). See MHACBO.

**ACL** The Administration for Community Living comprises the Administration on Aging (AoA), Administration on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (AIDD), and Center for Disability and Aging Policy with to address the community living service and support needs of both the aging and disability populations; enhance access to quality health care and long-term services and supports for all individuals; and promote consistency in community living policy across other areas of the Federal government. The Older Americans' Act is a major source of funding for related programs.



<b>ACT</b>	Assertive Community Treatment is an evidence-based practice designed to provide comprehensive treatment and support services to individuals with serious and persistent mental illness. ACT is intended to serve individuals who have severe functional impairments and who have not responded to traditional psychiatric outpatient treatment. ACT services are provided by a single multi-disciplinary team, which typically includes a psychiatrist, a nurse, and at least two case managers and are designed to meet the needs of each individual and to help keep the individual in the community and out of a structured service setting, such as residential or hospital care. At HHS, this program is a part of the Community Support Services division. YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>ACUMENTRA</b>	Former name for HealthInsight Oregon, an organization that contracts with the state to perform federally required reviews of Medicaid and other programs. Oregon also contracts with them to conduct a mail survey to consumers and families.
<b>ADA</b>	Americans with Disabilities Act
<b>ADES</b>	Alcohol and Drug Evaluation Service operates as the health and human services arm of its state-level substance abuse intervention program (DUII).
<b>ADF</b>	Alcohol & Drug Free housing designation often associated with supported housing programs
<b>ADL</b>	Activities of daily living are basic tasks that must be accomplished every day for an individual to thrive. Generally, ADLs can be broken down into the following categories: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>a) Personal hygiene - Bathing, grooming, oral, nail and hair care</li><li>b) Continence management - A person's mental and physical ability to properly use the bathroom</li><li>c) Dressing - A person's ability to select and wear the proper clothes for different occasions</li><li>d) Feeding - Whether a person can feed themselves or needs assistance</li><li>e) Ambulating - The extent of a person's ability to change from one position to the other and to walk independently</li></ul>
<b>ADPEP</b>	Alcohol and Drug Prevention and Education Program
<b>AFH</b>	Adult foster home means any home licensed by the Health Systems Division of the Authority in which residential care is provided to five or fewer individuals who are not related to the provider by blood or marriage as described in ORS 443.705 through 443.825. If an adult family member of the provider receives care, they shall be included as one of the individuals within the total license capacity of the AFH. An AFH or individual that advertises, including word-of-mouth advertising, to provide room, board, and care and services for adults is considered an AFH. For the purpose of these rules, an AFH does not include facilities referenced in ORS 443.715.
<b>AHCA</b>	After hours crisis services (Adult) – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>AHCY</b>	After hours crisis services (Youth) – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>ALF</b>	Assisted Living Facility
<b>AMH</b>	Adult mental health, a previous term for what is now considered Adult Behavioral Health to encompass both mental health and substance use disorder service integration.



- AMH** Addictions and Mental Health Services, within Health Systems Division of the Oregon Health Authority oversees and operates the system of care for mental health. It includes programs like Choice Model, formerly AMHI, Civil Commitment, Co-occurring Disorders, EASA, PASRR, Peer-Delivered Services, and the Oregon State Hospital.
- AMHI** Choice Model Services, previously known as the Adult Mental Health Initiative, is designed to promote more effective utilization of current capacity in facility-based treatment settings, increase care coordination and increase accountability at a local and state level. Choice Model will promote the availability and quality of individualized community-based services and supports so that adults with mental illness are served in the most independent environment possible and use of long-term institutional care is minimized.
- The targeted population is individuals over 18 years of age, who because of a mental illness:
- a) Are currently residing at a State Hospital
  - b) Are currently residing in a licensed community-based setting
  - c) Have been civilly committed and accepted on the State Hospital waitlist
- For individuals who reside in Yamhill County, Yamhill County Mental Health provides oversight and care coordination for clients within the targeted population. The goal is to ensure access to services consistent with the clinical needs of the client for the purpose of assisting each individual to live in the least restrictive environment possible. - AOC** Agency Operations Center – Emergency Preparedness
- AOCMHP** The Association of Oregon Community Mental Health Programs supports and advocates for Local Mental Health Authorities\* in their planning and management of mental health, addictions and developmental disabilities programs to ensure an effective local system of care.
- AOP** Adult outpatient – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
- APAC** All Payer All Claims
- APD** Aging and People with Disabilities, a State of Oregon Dept of Human Services agency tasked with managing adult foster homes.
- APHCS** Physical health covered services – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
- APS** Adult Protective Services
- ASAC** Adult Services Advisory Committee is a subcommittee that advises the Planning and Management Council at the state Addictions and Mental Health Division on matters related to adults in the mental health system.
- ASAM** American Society of Addiction Medicine, founded in 1954, is a professional medical society representing over 6,000 physicians, clinicians and associated professionals in the field of addiction medicine. ASAM is dedicated to increasing access and improving the quality of addiction treatment, educating physicians and the public, supporting research and prevention, and promoting the appropriate role of physicians in the care of patients with addiction.

<b>ASH</b>	Supported housing – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>ASPR</b>	Office of the Assistant Secretary for Preparedness and Response
<b>ASU</b>	The Actuarial Services Unit, a part of the Oregon Health Authority, is primarily responsible for Oregon Health Plan rate development/certification.
<b>ATS</b>	Adult Treatment Services usually used to define outpatient mental health services for adults.
<b>AYDIV</b>	Youth Diversion Program – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>AYDUI</b>	Alcohol and Drug DUII Youth Treatment – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>AYOP</b>	Alcohol and Drug Youth Outpatient Treatment – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>AYP</b>	Alcohol and Drug Youth Prevention – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>B</b>	
<b>BCCP</b>	Breast and Cervical Cancer Program – An Oregon Health Plan rate group
<b>BCN</b>	Short acronym for MVBCN, Mid Valley Behavioral Care Network, the behavioral health organization which at one time ran managed care organization for this region until the inception of CCOs in 2012. They no longer exist as of January 2020.
<b>BF</b>	Babies first – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>BH</b>	Behavioral Health
<b>BHICM</b>	Behavioral Health Intensive Case Manager
<b>BHQMC</b>	The Behavioral Health Quality Management Committee provides oversight, monitoring, and evaluating the quality and appropriateness of behavioral health care and services provided to Yamhill CCO members. The BHQMC is created by the YCHHS BH Leadership team to plan, recommend, and carry out quality management functions. The Utilization Management team of YCHHS' Administrative Services division organizes this regular meeting.
<b>BIP</b>	Biennial implementation plan
<b>BMI</b>	Body Mass Index is a person's weight in kilograms divided by the square of height in meters. A high BMI can be an indicator of high body fatness. BMI can be used to screen for weight categories that may lead to health problems, but it is not diagnostic of the body fatness or health of an individual.
<b>BO</b>	Board Orders are the numbers assigned to the approved actions of the Yamhill County Board of Commissioners.
<b>BRFSS</b>	Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey. The BRFSS is a random telephone survey of state residents aged 18 and older in households with telephones. In 2009, the BRFSS began conducting surveys by



cellular phone in addition to traditional “landline” telephones. BRFSS was initially developed in the early 1980s by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) in collaboration with state health departments and is currently conducted in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and several United States territories. Through BRFSS, information is collected in a routine, standardized manner at the state level on a variety of health behaviors and preventive health practices related to the leading causes of death and disability such as cardiovascular disease, cancer, diabetes and injuries.

- BRS** Behavior Rehabilitation Services improves the lives of children and adolescents with debilitating psychosocial, emotional and behavioral disorders by providing behavioral intervention, counseling, and skills-training services. The Department of Human Services contracts with private agencies throughout the state to provide these services to children or young adults who meet BRS eligibility criteria.
- BSS** Behavior Support Services are available to eligible individuals as part of the Medicaid funded Home and Community-Based Care Waiver. The program is designed to help people receiving care attain and maintain a maximal level of emotional and social functioning. Services are provided by specially trained "Behavior Consultants" utilizing a model of Positive Behavior Support. BSS focuses on developing supports within the person’s environment and improving interactions with caregivers in order to address:
- a) Challenging behaviors
  - b) Cognitive processing
  - c) Communication skills
  - d) Self-help activities
  - e) Impulse control
  - f) Adaptive skills

**C-WHO** Cornerstone – Whole Healthcare Organization, Inc. are 3rd Party External Auditors

**CACN** Maternal child health (MCH) – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment

**CaCoon** The CaCoon program is a nursing home visiting program that helps families with children with special health needs, such as developmental delays, cerebral palsy, and other health issues that require special medical and parenting services. We work with families from birth to the age of 21.

**CADC** Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor

**CAF** Crisis Assessment Form

**CAF** Children and families – An Oregon Health Plan rate group

**CAK** Cover all kids – A program run by the Oregon Health Authority that extends health care coverage through the Oregon Health Plan for all children in Oregon up to 300 percent of the federal poverty level – An Oregon Health Plan rate group

**CAMS** Collaborative Assessment and Managing of Suicidality is a therapeutic framework in which the therapist and patient work together toward a common goal in an open and honest dialogue about suicidality to help create a life worth living.



<b>CAMSA</b>	Collaborative Assessment and Management of Suicidality Program for Adults (see above CAMS definition). YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>CAMSY</b>	Collaborative assessment and management suicidality – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>CANS</b>	Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths certification
<b>CAR</b>	Contract Amendment Request is used by Community Mental Health Programs to request state funding for a specific adult receiving intensive services.
<b>CASII</b>	The Child and Adolescent Service Intensity Instrument is a standardized assessment tool that provides a determination of the appropriate level of service intensity needed by a child or adolescent and his or her family. It is unique in its capacity to determine a service intensity need, guide treatment planning, and monitor treatment outcome in all clinical and community-based settings. CASII is no longer used.
<b>CAT</b>	Crisis, Assessment, Triage team at Adult Behavioral Health. See the ABH Urgent and Emergent Care policy (016-072-03-01) for a detailed explanation of their role and responsibilities.
<b>CAWEM</b>	Citizen Waived Emergency Medical package
<b>CBT</b>	Cognitive Behavioral Therapy
<b>CCBHC</b>	Certified Community Behavioral Health Center. Yamhill County HHS is one of 11 CCBHCs in Oregon. CCBHCs were created through Section 223 of the Protecting Access to Medicare Act (PAMA), which established a demonstration program based on the Excellence in Mental Health Act. The Excellence in Mental Health Act demonstration program—also known as the Excellence Act or the Section 223 demonstration program—is a two-year, 8-state initiative to expand Americans’ access to mental health and addiction care in community-based settings. CCBHCs are responsible for directly providing (or contracting with partner organizations to provide) nine types of services, <sup>1</sup> with an emphasis on the provision of 24-hour crisis care, utilization of evidence-based practices, care coordination and integration with physical health care. The demonstration program represents the largest investment in mental health and addiction care in generations.
<b>CCO</b>	A coordinated care organization is a network of all types of health care providers (physical health care, addictions and mental health care and dental care providers) who work together in their local communities to serve people who receive health care coverage under the Oregon Health Plan (Medicaid). CCOs focus on prevention and helping people manage chronic conditions, like diabetes. This helps reduce unnecessary emergency room visits and gives people support to be healthy. There are currently 15 CCOs in Oregon.
<b>CCPC</b>	Christian Community Placement Center; now does business as Connections365, providing mentoring services to youth involved in Family and Youth programs.
<b>CCS</b>	Catholic Community Services is a non-profit, faith-based organization. Founded in Salem, Oregon in 1938, CCS offers 17 programs across 9 Oregon counties and serves more than 5,000 people each year. The program run by CCS that HHS works most closely with is the Rainbow Lodge, a 5-bed crisis/planned respite facility for children in the hills of McMinnville.



- CCS** Court Coordinated Services is a program run by Yamhill Circuit Court for individuals with co-occurring substance use/mental health needs since 2003. As of 2019, there were an average of 20 participants monthly.
- CD** Chemical Dependency is the old term for substance use disorder (SUD) programs.
- CDC** Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
- CDDP** The Community Developmental Disabilities Program for Yamhill County is one of YCHHS' divisions. This program offers services for children and adults with Intellectual Disabilities and other qualifying Developmental Disabilities residing in Yamhill County.
- The State of Oregon, Department of Human Services, contracts with each County to provide a variety of services to adults and children with developmental disabilities through local Community Developmental Disabilities Programs.
- Yamhill County Developmental Disabilities Program participates with Yamhill County Health & Human Services Department in planning and developing resources, coordinating services, and negotiating and monitoring contracts. Our services include intake and eligibility determination, choice of case management services, in-home services, residential services, and crisis services. Adults may choose vocational services and transportation services.
- CFDA** The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance
- CFR** Code of Federal Regulations
- CFT** A Child and Family Team refers to a group of individuals who collaborate with one another to support and serve the child/youth and family to ensure that the child's/youth's needs are being met. In Yamhill County, these CFT are a part of a Wraparound services program.
- CGAC** Gambling Addiction Counselor certification
- CGF** County General Fund
- CHA** Community health assessment. Community health assessment calls for regularly and systematically collecting, analyzing, and making available information on the health of a community, including statistics on health status, community health needs, epidemiologic and other studies of health problems. Often this can take the form of community needs assessments, which are intended to assist the community in adapting and responding to important health problems and risks. Increasingly, moving beyond problems and deficits toward an analysis of community strengths and resources is becoming recognized as a critical part of understanding a community's health. Conducting a community health assessment is required for state and county public health accreditation as well as for Coordinated Care Organizations (CCOs).
- CHIP** Children's Health Insurance Program. Oregon CHIP Medicaid is federally and state funded program that provides low-cost health coverage to children in families that earn too much money to qualify for Medicaid yet cannot afford to buy private health insurance.



- CHP** Community Health Profile is a comprehensive compilation of measures representing multiple categories, or domains, that contributes to a description of health status at a community level and the resources available to address health needs. Measures within each domain may be tracked over time to determine trends, to evaluate health interventions or policy decisions, to compare community data with peer, state, national or benchmark measures, and to establish priorities through an informed community process.
- CIM** Community Integration Manager or CIM is the web-based claims/authorization platform designed and hosted by PH Tech for use in managing the authorizations, claims, and payments for behavioral health services to Yamhill CCO members.
- CIT** Crisis Intervention Training is a training program developed in several U.S. states (including Oregon) to help police officers react appropriately to situations involving mental illness or developmental disability. Communities large and small are seeking answers to managing crisis issues and crisis intervention services.
- CJC** Criminal Justice Commission
- CLHO** The Coalition of Local Health Officials (CLHO) is a dues-based membership association that primarily focuses on making sure Local Public Health Authorities have the ability and resources to improve the health of all people living in Oregon, and at the most basic level, properly address public health needs and protect their communities. CLHO shares an acronym with the Conference of Local Health Officials but is a separate 501(c)(6) non-profit with a focus on advocacy and technical assistance.
- CMHP** Community Mental Health Program - means the organization of various services for individuals with a mental health diagnosis or substance use disorders operated by or contractually affiliated with a local mental health authority (LMHA) and operated in a specific geographic area of the state under an agreement with the Division pursuant to OAR chapter 309, division 014.
- CMS** The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services, previously known as the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), is a federal agency within the United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) that administers the Medicare program and works in partnership with state governments to administer Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), and health insurance portability standards. In addition to these programs, CMS has other responsibilities, including the administrative simplification standards from the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA), quality standards in long-term care facilities (more commonly referred to as nursing homes) through its survey and certification process, clinical laboratory quality standards under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments, and oversight of HealthCare.gov.
- COA** A provider that is certified by the Health Systems Division of the Oregon Health Authority. Mental Health Certified provider receives a Certificate of Approval (COA) and Substance Use Disorder prover receives a Letter of Approval (LOA) form the Health Systems Division.
- COB** Coordination of benefits is the practice of ensuring that insurance claims are not paid multiple times, when an enrollee is covered by two health plans at the same time. The idea behind coordination of benefits is to ensure that the payments of both plans do not exceed 100% of the covered charges. The provision coordinates the health care benefits in the order in which the multiple health plans must pay



benefits. Under a COB provision, insurance companies share the burden without overpaying. COB determines which plan is primary and which is secondary. The primary plan will pay the claims first and the unpaid balance will be paid by the secondary plan to the limit of its responsibility. Benefits are coordinated between the two health plans to ensure that policyholder receives full coverage. However, over insurance or excess coverage is not permitted under COB.

- COD** A co-occurring disorder usually refers to the presence of a mental health and a substance abuse disorder.
- COR** County of Responsibility - the assigned county of residence for people receiving community mental health services.
- COS** Community Outreach Services team at Adult Behavioral Health. See the ABH Urgent and Emergent Care policy (016-072-03-01) for a detailed explanation of their role and responsibilities. YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
- CPA** Client Prior Authorization
- CPMS** Client Process Monitoring System collected status and service data on all Medicaid and non-Medicaid services. This system was retired in 2014 and replaced with the Measures and Outcomes Tracking System (MOTS).
- CR** Conditional Release means placement by a court or the Psychiatric Security Review Board (PSRB) of an individual who has been found eligible under ORS 161.327 or 161.336 for supervision and treatment in a community setting.
- CRA** Crisis services adult mental health – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
- CRI** The Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) program is a regional bioterrorism preparedness program funded by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. CRI serves the seven counties in the federally delineated Portland Metropolitan Services Area (MSA). Five counties are in Oregon: Clackamas, Columbia, Multnomah, Washington and Yamhill; and two counties in Washington: Clark, Skamania. Clark and Skamania counties are overseen by the CRI coordinator in Clark county.
- CRM** A Certified Recovery Mentor is an addiction treatment and/or recovery consumer who has been trained and certified to help other consumers identify and achieve self-determined goals of recovery. The CRM cultivates the consumer’s ability to make informed, independent choices and assists consumers in gaining information and support from the community. A CRM means a person providing peer delivered services to an individual or family member with similar life experience. A CRM must complete an AMH approved addiction training program (peer delivered services) and be: A self-identified person in recovery from a substance use disorder, who meets the abstinence requirements for recovering staff in alcohol and other drug treatment programs (2 years of abstinence).
- CRMO** Certified Recovery Mentor (CRM see above) outreach services – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
- CRO** Consumer Run Organizations a peer managed and operated organization that provides peer support. Local examples of a consumer-run organization include ProjectABLE, Provoking Hope, and Champion Team.



<b>CRY</b>	Crisis services youth – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>CSA</b>	Community Support Alliance, Yamhill County HHS’ second Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) team, effective January 2018. YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>CSAC</b>	Children’s System Advisory Committee is an advisory committee to the Office of Addictions & Mental Health Division, Oregon Health Authority and will focus on mental health (including suicide, substance abuse, violence, and bullying) issues for children, youth, and young adults and their family members. CSAC will provide oversight and input to increase the availability and quality of individualized, intensive, and culturally competent home and community-based services so the needs of children and youth are met in the most natural environment possible. The goals are to minimize the use of out-of-home and institutional care.
<b>CSCI</b>	Children's System Change Initiative transferred management of children's intensive services including residential care to MHO's. MVBCN created the New Solutions program to serve these children. Over time, this program evolved into the Wraparound program today at Family and Youth.
<b>CSL</b>	Community Supported Living
<b>CSIT</b>	Community Support Integration Team
<b>CSS</b>	The Community Support Services team provides an array of community-based services focused on supporting individuals with mental illness pursue their recovery goals, improve wellness, and achieve their full potential in their: <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>a) Health: overcoming or managing one’s disease(s) as well as living in a physically and emotionally healthy way;</li><li>b) Home: a stable and safe place to live;</li><li>c) Purpose: meaningful daily activities, such as a job, school, volunteerism, family caretaking, or creative endeavors, and the independence, income and resources to participate in society; and</li><li>d) Community: relationships and social networks that provide support, friendship, love, and hope.</li></ul>
<b>CVSO</b>	County Veterans Services Officer
<b>CWP</b>	Community Wellness and Prevention program
<b>CY</b>	Calendar Year (from January 1 through December 31)
<b><u>D</u></b>	
<b>DBT/DBTA</b>	Dialectical Behavioral Therapy provides evidence-based treatment designed to assist individuals to develop skills of mindfulness, distress tolerance, emotional regulation, and interpersonal effectiveness. DBT is an evidence based practiced used to treat a wide range of conditions including, but not limited to, self-harming behaviors, eating disorders, substance use disorders, and major depressive disorders. <b>DC57</b>	Drug court JAG measure 57 – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>DCHR</b>	High risk drug court – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment



<b>DCO</b>	Dental Care Organization means a PHP that provides and coordinates dental services as capitated services under OHP.

The DLA-20 supports the functional assessment data needs of service providers. It provides a quick way to identify where outcomes are needed so clinicians can address functional deficits on individualized service plans. This tool ensures valid scores and consistent utilization for healthcare report cards. The DLA-20 is intended for use with all disabilities and ages. The information yielded by DLA-20 is critical for treatment planning and estimating Axis-V (Global Assessment of Functioning) of the DSM-IV and contributes valuable information for psychiatric approval for Medicaid reimbursement and healthcare reporting standards.
<b>DMAP</b>	Division of Medical Assistance Programs oversees the Oregon Health Plan, which is a public and private partnership that ensures access to a basic level of health care for Oregonians. The division also includes provisions for oversight, research and analysis to achieve the best use of health-care funding.
<b>DMAT</b>	Disaster Medical Assistance Team
<b>DMORT</b>	Disaster Mortuary Operational Response Team
<b>DOC</b>	Department of Corrections
<b>DOC</b>	Department Operations Center

<b>Dx</b>	An abbreviation for the word “diagnosis” that means the principal mental health, substance use, or problem gambling diagnosis listed in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM). The diagnosis is determined through the assessment and any examinations, tests, or consultations suggested by the assessment and is the medically appropriate reason for services.

- EADC** Enhanced Adult Drug Court program – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment (obsolete)
- EASA** Early Assessment and Support Alliance, previously called Early Assessment & Support Team (EAST) uses evidence-based practices to do early assessment and intervention for young adults having their first experience with psychosis. Its primary purpose is to reduce the disability associated with psychosis offering early effective care for schizophrenia and related disorders through clinical teams in each county. YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
- EBP** Evidence-Based Practice specific treatment interventions that are supported by scientific research.
- ECC** Emergency Coordination Center
- ECF** The Enhanced Care Facility (ECF) is an Aging and People with Disabilities (APD) licensed, community based residential program serving 16 people. Enhanced Care is designed to provide 24-hour supervision and support to eligible individuals who demonstrate challenging behaviors and psychiatric symptoms. Nursing care is available and provider staff are always present to assist residents with care needs. Yamhill County HHS staff are on-site to offer rehabilitative behavioral health services and supports 12 hours per day, seven days a week. YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
- ECMU** AMH Extended Care Management
- ECOS** Enhanced Care Outreach Services is a program that provides individualized wrap-around rehabilitative behavioral health services (including assessment, service planning, individual therapy, consultation, individual & group skills training, medication management, facilitation of quarterly treatment team meetings, 24-hour crisis coverage, and provider staff training) to individuals residing in APD-licensed community settings. People served in ECOS must meet specific Enhanced Care eligibility.
- The following criteria are generally considered to determine eligibility for Enhanced Care Outreach Services:
- a) An individual must be determined by Aging & People with Disabilities to be financial and service eligible for community-based care services and must be determined by the AMH Statewide Enhanced Care Services Coordinator as eligible for Enhanced Care Services based on specific diagnostic criteria (which typically includes a diagnosis of severe and persistent mental illness with challenging behaviors that impact overall functioning).
  - b) An eligible individual generally exhibits two or more of the following: self-endangering behaviors, physically aggressive behaviors, intrusive behaviors, severe & persistent psychiatric symptoms, complex medication needs, sexually intrusive behaviors, or elopement behaviors.
  - c) An eligible typically has a history of failed community placements or is currently an inpatient at a psychiatric hospital and ineligible for placement in a non-enhanced setting.

- ED** Eating Disorder programs are designed to treat conditions characterized by irregular or abnormal eating habits.
- ED** Emergency Department for a local hospital.



- EDI** Electronic data interchange is the transfer of data from one computer system to another by standard message formatting without the need for human intervention. Many insurance claims are submitted through EDI processes.
- EDIE** Emergency Department Information Exchange
- e.g.** Exempli gratia in Latin, meaning “for example”
- EHR** EHR or electronic health record are digital records of health information. They contain all the information you’d find in a paper chart — and a lot more. EHRs include past medical history, vital signs, progress notes, diagnoses, medications, immunization dates, allergies, lab data and imaging reports. They can also contain other relevant information, such as insurance information, demographic data, and even data imported from personal wellness devices.

The power of an EHR lies not only in the data it contains, but how it’s shared. EHRs makes health information instantly accessible to authorized providers across practices and health organizations, helping to inform clinical decisions and coordinate care. An EHR can be shared with all clinicians and organizations involved in a patient’s care such as labs, specialists, imaging facilities, pharmacies, emergency facilities, and school and workplace clinics.

An EHR is also necessary to meet Meaningful Use requirements. Meaningful Use is a Medicare and Medicaid program that supports the use of an EHR to improve patient care. To achieve Meaningful Use and avoid penalties on Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements, eligible providers must follow a set of criteria that serve as a roadmap for effectively using an EHR.

An electronic health record (EHR) makes health information instantly accessible to authorized providers across practices and health organizations. It contains a patient’s medical history, diagnoses, medications, treatment plans, immunization dates, allergies, radiology images, and lab results, among other medical information.

EHRs are the future of healthcare because they provide critical data that informs clinical decisions, and they help coordinate care between all providers in the healthcare ecosystem.

- EMDR** Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing is a psychotherapy that enables people to heal from the symptoms and emotional distress that are the result of disturbing life experiences. Repeated studies show that by using EMDR therapy people can experience the benefits of psychotherapy that once took years to make a difference. It is widely assumed that severe emotional pain requires a long time to heal. EMDR therapy shows that the mind can in fact heal from psychological trauma much as the body recovers from physical trauma
- EMR** Electronic medical record refers to everything you’d find in a paper chart, such as medical history, diagnoses, medications, immunization dates, allergies. While EMRs work well within a practice, they’re limited because they don’t easily travel outside the practice. In fact, the patient’s medical record might even have to be printed out and mailed for another provider to see it. *See EHR.*
- EMS** Emergency Medical Services focuses on ensuring a functioning emergency care system. This includes licensing paramedics and emergency medical technicians, approving the training curriculum and licensing EMS instructors, ensuring ambulances are safe and well-equipped, and ensuring that every



community has access to emergency care-from first responders through to a sophisticated trauma center.

- ENCC** Exceptional Needs Care Coordination means for pre-paid health plans a specialized case management service for members identified as aged, blind, or disabled, who have complex medical needs, consistent with OAR 410-141-0405. ENCC includes: early identification of those members who are aged, blind, or disabled who have complex medical needs; assistance to ensure timely access to providers and capitated services; coordination with providers to ensure consideration is given to unique needs in treatment planning; assistance to providers with coordination of capitated services and discharge planning; and aid with coordinating community support and social service system linkages with medical care systems, as necessary and appropriate.
- EOB** An explanation of benefits is a statement sent by a health insurance company to covered individuals explaining what medical treatments and/or services were paid for on their behalf.
- EOC** Emergency Operations Center
- EOP** Enhanced Chemical Dependency Outpatient Treatment Program. EOP treatment group focuses on a higher level of outreach and engagement with clients who come into services. The providers offer a unique set of skills and styles to help clients who are struggling with abstinence and compliance with community partners achieve better outcomes. Specialty training and skills in this team include marriage and family therapy, social work, dual-diagnosis, criminal thinking and community-based support knowledge. - EOP** Insurance Explanation of Payment
- EPI** Communicable disease and epidemiology – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment

- FFS** Fee for service is a payment model where services are unbundled and paid for separately. In health care, it gives an incentive for physicians to provide more treatments because payment is dependent on the quantity of care, rather than quality of care.
- F&Y** Yamhill County HHS Family and Youth Programs provides services to meet the mental health, addictions, and behavioral needs experienced by children, adolescents, and their families. Early childhood mental health and attachment concerns, drug and alcohol services, attention deficit hyperactivity, depression,



anxiety, sexual abuse and sexual offending, effects of domestic violence, violence intervention and aggression problems, parenting difficulties, divorce, impulse control problems, social skills deficits, and adjustment problems are just some of the issues we can address.

<b>FY</b>	Fiscal Year (July 1 through June 30)
<b>FSS</b>	Family Stabilization Services refers to the array of services provided by Lutheran Community Services. FSS are short-term and intensive services to families with children 0-19 and who are at risk of out of home placement, children who are reuniting with families after out of home placement and foster/adoptive families who have children experiencing disruptive placements. Services by QMHAs include skills training to children, adolescents and adults to address safety concerns and develop and implement effective safety plans. Services will be provided in community settings, at client homes, and in office settings (either FY programs or LCS offices).
<b>FSS</b>	Family Support Specialist means an individual who meets qualification criteria adopted under ORS 414.665 and may be either a peer support specialist or a peer wellness specialist who, based on similar life experiences, provides support services to and has experience parenting a child who: a. <b>GAF</b>	The Global Assessment of Functioning is a scoring system that mental health professionals use to assess how well an individual is functioning in their daily lives. This scale was once used to measure the impact of psychiatric illness on a person's life and daily functional skills and abilities.
<b>GAFT</b>	Gambling aftercare – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>GAM</b>	Gambling treatment – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>GFU</b>	George Fox University, located in Newberg, provides after hours crisis screenings at local hospitals (Providence and Willamette Valley) on behalf of HHS.
<b>GIS</b>	Geographic Information Systems Combines modern computer and supercomputing digital technology with data management systems to provide tools for the capture, storage, manipulation, analysis, and visualization of spatial data. Spatial data contains information, usually in the form of a geographic coordinate system that gives data location relative to the earth's surface. These spatial attributes enable previously disparate data sets to be integrated into a digital mapping environment.

<b>HIA</b>	Health impact assessments refers to any combination of qualitative and quantitative methods used to assess the population health consequences of a policy, project, or program that does not have health as its primary objective (i.e., assessing the health consequences of non-health-sector actions).
<b>HK</b>	A billing modifier used to indicate fee-for-service services provided to "High Risk" individuals who are living in a residential facility and have exceptional needs.
<b>HbA1C</b>	The hemoglobin A1c test determines the average level of blood sugar over the past 2 to 3 months. It's also called HbA1c, glycated hemoglobin test, and glycohemoglobin. People who have diabetes need this test regularly to see if their levels are staying within range. It can also help determine if medication adjustments are needed and is used to diagnose diabetes.
<b>HCBS</b>	Home and Community Based Services See 1915(i). – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>HEDIS</b>	The Healthcare Effectiveness Data and Information Set is one of healthcare's most widely used performance improvement tools. 190 million people are enrolled in plans that report HEDIS results. OHA uses HEDIS performance measures in CCO contracting.
<b>HERC</b>	The Health Evidence Review Commission reviews medical evidence in order to prioritize health spending in the Oregon Health Plan and to promote evidence-based medical practice statewide through comparative effectiveness reports, including coverage guidance and multisector interventions, health technology assessments and evidence-based practice guidelines. The commission uses a transparent public process to ensure that its decisions are made in the best interest of patients and taxpayers while considering input from providers and members of the public, including those affected by the conditions discussed. The most notable published document from this group is the Prioritized List, which lists the covered/non-covered Medicaid diagnoses and billable (paired) services.
<b>HHS</b>	Health and Human Services
<b>HIE</b>	Health information exchange is the electronic transmission of healthcare-related data among medical facilities, health information organizations -- companies that oversee and govern the exchange of this data -- and government agencies according to national standards.
<b>HIT</b>	Health information technology is information technology applied to health and health care. It supports health information management across computerized systems and the secure exchange of health information between consumers, providers, payers, and quality monitors.
<b>HIPAA</b>	The federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 and the regulations published in Title 45, parts 160 and 164, of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR).
<b>HL7</b>	Health Level Seven is an organization involved in development of international healthcare standards. HL7 is a protocol for data exchange in that it defines the format and the content of messages that



healthcare applications use when exchanging information with each other. HL7 standard is not concerned with how messages are delivered between applications.

**ICS** Incident Command System

**ICTS** Intensive Community Treatment & Support services are offered by YCHHS FY programs. ICTS services for children and their families include individual therapy, family therapy, medication management, and skills training. Services can be provided in the therapist’s office, the community, or in the family home, depending on the need and preferences of the team. These services are provided to families with the hope of keeping children in their homes. Staff are also available on a 24-hour basis to provide crisis support to the child and the family.

**I/DD** Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities Program offers services for children and adults with Intellectual Disabilities and other qualifying Developmental Disabilities residing in Yamhill County.

The State of Oregon, Department of Human Services, contracts with each County to provide a variety of services to adults and children with developmental disabilities through local Community Developmental Disabilities Programs (CDDP).

Yamhill County Developmental Disabilities Program participates with Yamhill County Health & Human Services Department in planning and developing resources, coordinating services, and negotiating and monitoring contracts. Our services include intake and eligibility determination, choice of case management services, in-home services, residential services, and crisis services. Adults may choose vocational services and transportation services.

**IDPF** Intoxicated Driver Program Fund

**IDT** Interdisciplinary Team means a group of professional and direct care staff that have primary responsibility for the development of a Service Plan for an individual receiving services.

**i.e.** Id est in Latin, meaning “that is”

**IHN** InterCommunity Health Network is a coordinated care organization (CCO) that was formed in 2012 as a partnership to improve the health outcomes of the people living in Benton, Lincoln, and Linn counties in Oregon.

**IM** Immunizations – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment

**IM** Intramuscular - Intramuscular injection is a technique used to deliver a medication deep into the muscles.

**IMD** Institution for Mental Diseases means, as defined in 42 CFR 435.1010, a hospital, nursing facility, or other institution of more than 16 beds that is primarily engaged in providing inpatient psychiatric services such as diagnosis, treatment, or care of individuals with mental diseases, including medical attention, nursing care, and related services. Its primary character is that of a facility established and maintained primarily for the care and treatment of individuals with mental diseases, whether it is licensed as such.



<b>IMR</b>	Illness Management & Recovery program is an evidence-based practice that helps adults set meaningful goals for themselves, acquire information and skills to better manage their mental illness and make progress in their recovery. IMR programs are a part of the Community Support Services division of YCHHS. YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>IMSuRT</b>	International Medical Surgical Teams
<b>IOP</b>	Intensive Outpatient Program refers to services received a higher frequency than regular outpatient services. See Level of Care (LOC) model for categories. YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment.
<b>IOSS</b>	Intensive Outpatient Services and Supports means a specialized set of comprehensive in-home and community-based supports and mental health treatment services for children that are developed by the child and family team and delivered in the most integrated setting in the community.
<b>IPS</b>	Individual Placement and Support (IPS) Supported Employment is an evidence-based approach to supported employment for people who have a mental illness. IPS stands for Individual Placement and Support. IPS supports people in their efforts to achieve steady, meaningful employment in mainstream competitive jobs, either part-time or full-time.

<b>ISN</b>	Integrated Services Network
<b>ISSP</b>	Individualized Service & Supports Plan a comprehensive plan for services and supports provided to or coordinated for an individual and his/her family, as applicable, that is reflective of the assessment and intended outcomes of service.
<b>IUD</b>	Intrauterine Device – Long acting hormonal or non-hormonal contraceptive inserted in the Uterus to prevent pregnancy (e.g. Paragard, Mirena, Skyla)
<b>IUS</b>	Intrauterine System – Long acting hormonal contraceptive inserted in the Uterus to prevent pregnancy (e.g. Mirena, Skyla), often used interchangeably with IUD.

<b>JPSRB</b>	Juvenile Psychiatric Security Review Board. In 2005, the Oregon Legislature passed a bill modifying the existing Psychiatric Security Review Board (PRSB) statute, creating a juvenile panel for management of juvenile insanity acquittees. Dubbed the Juvenile PSRB (JPSRB), it borrows heavily from the 30 years of experience of its adult predecessor. Statutory language was also modified to create a plea of “responsible except for insanity” for juveniles in Oregon.

- LARC** Long-acting reversible contraceptive - includes IUD/IUS/contraceptive implant
- LE** Law Enforcement
- LEDS** Law Enforcement Data System is a State of Oregon database used by all law enforcement agencies to share information. This database was created in response to HB3466 (passed into law on January 1, 2010) making it a requirement “to create medical health database to aid law enforcement agencies in assisting persons with mental illness.” Law enforcement use the information during legal contacts or crisis/emergency situations to best serve the individual. This may include contacting agencies that are providing services such as mental or physical health, or family members or friends.

<b>SEd</b>	Supported Education is an evidence-based service for individuals experiencing challenges with obtaining or maintaining education due to their mental health condition. <b>SEPA</b>	Service Element Prior Authorization
<b>SERV-OR</b>	State Emergency Registry of Volunteers for Oregon
<b>SGF</b>	State General Funds
<b>SI</b>	Subject Individual
<b>SIM</b>	Sequential Intercept Model clarifies five points at which standard processing of crimes can be intervened with community-based actions, so that individuals with mental and psychiatric disorders would not have to further penetrate the criminal justice system.
<b>SMAP</b>	Medication administration program – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>SMI</b>	Serious mental illness is defined as a mental, behavioral, or emotional disorder resulting in serious functional impairment, which substantially interferes with or limits one or more major life activities.
<b>SMVP</b>	State Managed Volunteer Pool
<b>SNF</b>	Skilled Nursing Facility
<b>SNRG</b>	Special Needs Rate Group, a category of Oregon Health Plan, Medicaid
<b>SNS</b>	Strategic National Stockpile



<b>SOR</b>	The state-opioid response (SOR) grant released by SAMHSA aimed at addressing the opioid crisis by increasing access to medication-assisted treatment using the three FDA-approved medications for the treatment of opioid use disorder, reducing unmet treatment need, and reducing opioid overdose related deaths through the provision of prevention, treatment and recovery activities for opioid use disorder (OUD) (including prescription opioids, heroin and illicit fentanyl and fentanyl analogs).
<b>SOS</b>	Secretary of State or Senior Office Specialist
<b>SOT</b>	Sex offender treatment – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>SPD</b>	Seniors & Persons with Disabilities division of Oregon state government for Seniors and People with Disabilities services are primarily related to physical and developmental disabilities, although they handle benefits issues for people with psychiatric disabilities as well
<b>SPMI</b>	Serious and persistent mental illness, is a group of severe mental health disorders as defined in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual used by mental health professionals to diagnose clients.
<b>SPoC</b>	Shared Plan of Care
<b>SPRFP</b>	The Department of Human Services' Strengthening, Preserving and Reunifying Families Program. The Oregon Legislature recognized and codified this performance-based approach to developing community-based programs and services for children and families involved in the child welfare system. This effort complements the work of the Coordinated Care Organizations and the future work of the Early Learning Council hubs, targeting children and families involved in the child welfare system. Local collaborations of interested stakeholders determine community strengths and service gaps and request funding targeted to specific outcomes focusing on keeping children safe and families together. These programs are an essential complement to the implementation of Differential Response and supporting children being safely parented at home. Implementation of this approach and investment in a more comprehensive service continuum has begun in seven counties with the rest of the state projected to implement in the 13-15 biennium.
<b>SRTF</b>	A Secure Residential Treatment Facility is a facility that is locked and the most restrictive of the housing programs. In addition, any Residential Treatment Facility, or portion thereof, approved by the Division that restricts an individual's exit from the setting using approved locking devices on individual exit doors, gates, or other closures.
<b>SSI</b>	Supplemental Security Income
<b>SSP</b>	Self Sufficiency Program
<b>SSPH</b>	State Support for Public Health. Funds provided under this Agreement for this Program Element may only be used in accordance with, and subject to, the requirements and limitations set forth below, to operate a Communicable Disease control program in LPHA's service area that includes the following components: a) epidemiological investigations that report, monitor and control Communicable Disease, b) diagnostic and consultative Communicable Disease services,



- c) early detection, education, and prevention activities to reduce the morbidity and mortality of reportable Communicable Diseases,
- d) appropriate immunizations for human and animal target populations to control and reduce the incidence of Communicable Diseases, and
- e) collection and analysis of Communicable Disease and other health hazard data for program planning and management.

**STD** Sexually transmitted diseases – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment

**STI** Sexually transmitted infection (often used interchangeably with STD, but differs in that it refers to an infection, not disease)

**SUD** Substance use disorder

**TANF** Temporary Assistance to Needy Families. The TANF program, which is time limited, assists families with children when the parents or other responsible relatives cannot provide for the family's basic needs. The Federal government provides grants to States to run the TANF program – An Oregon Health Plan rate group

**TB** Tuberculosis

**TCM** Targeted Case Management Services means case management services furnished to a specific target group of eligible clients under the Medicaid State Plan to gain access to needed medical, social, educational, and other services (such as housing or transportation).

**TCMP** TCM perinatal women – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment

**THW** Traditional Health Worker is an umbrella term for frontline public health workers who work in a community or clinic under the direction of a licensed health provider. There are five specialty types of THWs:

- a) Birth Doulas. Assist women and their family with pre-natal, childbirth and post-partum care.
- b) Personal Health Navigators (PHN). Provides information, assistance, tools and support to enable a patient to make the best health care decisions.
- c) Peer Support Specialists (PSS). Focus on recovery from addiction/mental health conditions.
- d) Peer Wellness Specialists (PWS). Focus on recovery from addiction/mental health and physical conditions.

A) Family Support Specialist means an individual who meets qualification criteria adopted under ORS 414.665 and may be either a peer support specialist or a peer wellness specialist who, based on similar life experiences, provides support services to and has experience parenting a child who:

- i) Is a current or former consumer of mental health or addiction treatment; or
- ii) Is facing or has faced difficulties in accessing education, health, and wellness services due to mental health or behavioral health barriers.

B) Youth Support Specialist means an individual who meets qualification criteria adopted under ORS 414.665 and may be either a peer support specialist or a peer wellness specialist and who, based on a similar life experience, provides supportive services to an individual who:

- i) Is not older than 30 years old, and



- ii) Is a current or former consumer of mental health or addiction treatment; or
- iii) Is facing or has faced difficulties in accessing education, health, and wellness services due to mental health Community Health Workers (CHW) or behavioral health barriers.
- e) Community Health Workers (CHW)

<b>TIC</b>	Trauma Informed Care
<b>TIM</b>	Travel clinic – YCHHS Juniper (EHR) Service Category Enrollment
<b>TPEP</b>	Tobacco Prevention and Education Program
<b>TPL</b>	Third Party Liability refers to the legal obligation of third parties (for example, certain individuals, entities, insurers, or programs) to pay part or all the expenditures for medical assistance furnished under a Medicaid state plan. By law, all other available third-party resources must meet their legal obligation to pay claims before the Medicaid program pays for the care of an individual eligible for Medicaid.
<b>TPR</b>	Termination of Parental Rights
<b>TTRS</b>	The goal of Yamhill County Health and Human Services (YCHHS) Transitional Treatment Recovery Services (TTRS) is to provide safe clean and sober housing, along with intensive A&D treatment and other supportive and family stabilization services in a structured, supervised environment for parents and their children. This program is designed to promote the return of children to their parent's care sooner or eliminate the need to place the children in foster care, by providing support and guidance to participants and their families in transition to a self-sufficient lifestyle.
<b>Tx</b>	An abbreviation used to denote “treatment.”
<b>U</b>	
<b>UDS</b>	Urinary Drug Screen
<b>UM</b>	Utilization Management is "the evaluation of the medical necessity, appropriateness, and efficiency of the use of health care services, procedures, and facilities under the provisions of the applicable health benefits plan, sometimes called 'utilization review'. The Utilization Management team at YCHHS is a part of the Administrative Services division.
<b>UR</b>	Utilization Review is a system for reviewing the medical necessity, appropriateness, and reasonableness of services proposed or provided services to a patient or group of patients. This review is conducted on a prospective, concurrent, and/or retrospective basis to reduce the incidence of unnecessary and/or inappropriate provision of services. Utilization review is a process that has two primary purposes: to improve the quality of services (and patient outcomes) and to ensure the efficient expenditure of money.

This measure is useful for assessing the impact of a particular public health problem on the economy in terms of lost work years and earnings, and on family life in terms of impact on surviving spouses and children. It should be noted that a large percentage of the causes of YPLL are preventable through behavior modification, lifestyle changes, and substance abuse reduction.
