This is your Yamhill County Voters' Pamphlet for the May 15, 2018, Primary Election. This pamphlet provides a forum for candidates to introduce themselves. You will also find information about various measures for your consideration. Each jurisdiction submitting a measure prepares its own Ballot Title and Explanatory Statement.

Candidate statements and measure arguments are included in this pamphlet after paying a fee. If a candidate does not appear in the pamphlet, it is because he or she chose not to be included.

We print the text of each statement or argument exactly as submitted by the author (or cut off after exceeding the maximum number of words allowed). The law forbids us from making corrections for punctuation, grammar, syntax errors or inaccurate information. Those submitting statements and arguments for the voters' pamphlet are solely responsible for the content. We cannot create content for those that do not submit statements.

The Secretary of State draws a random alphabet sortation unique to each election. Candidates appear in that order both in this pamphlet and on the ballot.

This pamphlet includes all measures and races in the county for this election - your ballot will include only those relevant to you.

Please note that the office of Yamhill County Sheriff is a constitutional office that must be elected in the General Election. Since only one candidate filed for that office, the race moves directly to the November 6, 2018, General Election.

There is at least one "Official Ballot Drop Site" located in each city in the county. Look for the list of Official Drop Sites in this pamphlet or on our website. You may deposit your ballot in any drop site listed, 24 hours per day.

**Ballots deposited in an Official Ballot Drop Site get to us postage-free.
If you mail your ballot, you must apply proper postage.**

Remember, **postmarks do not count**. Your ballot must be in an Official Ballot Drop Site or at the Yamhill County Clerk's Office by **8:00 p.m.** Election Day, **May 15, 2018**.

We invite any voter who needs assistance in voting because of any disability to contact us. We will make every effort to meet your voting needs. Please contact us at 503-434-7518.



Precinct Committeepersons

75 candidates filed

If you are a member of the Democratic or Republican party, you will receive a ballot with "Precinct Committeepersons" (PCPs) on it. These are men and women who represent their political party in each precinct on a countywide "Central Committee".

Precinct Committeepersons do not file Voters' Pamphlet statements. They are political party offices and not public elected officials.

- You **do not have to vote** for any PCPs
- You do not have to vote for each position
- "Write-in" candidates are allowed
- A successful "write-in" candidate must receive at least 3 votes from members of their party
- We encourage writing in only names of people you know want to serve, and who live in your precinct

Before any ballot return envelope is opened, a human compares the signature on the envelope with the signature in the voter's registration file. If the signatures do not match, the envelope is not opened.

VOTER REGISTRATION INFORMATION

To be eligible to vote in the May 15, 2018 Primary Election, a completed voter registration card must be on file with the Yamhill County Clerk by no later than 5:00 p.m., April 24, 2018.

YOU MAY REGISTER TO VOTE IF:

- You are a citizen of the United States
- You are at least 16 years of age (*you may vote if you will be 18 years of age or older on election day*)
- You are a resident of Oregon

YOU MUST RE-REGISTER TO VOTE IF:

- Your residence or mailing address changes
- Your name changes
- You wish to change party affiliation

VOTING INSTRUCTIONS

When you receive your ballot packet in the mail, immediately examine it to make certain it is complete. It should contain the following items:

- A printed ballot on which you may vote your choice
- A secrecy sleeve with voting instructions printed on it
- A pre-addressed blue-trimmed return envelope in which to return your ballot

If any items are missing, contact the Yamhill County Clerk's Office, at 503-434-7518 (or 503-554-7850 from Newberg), and a replacement ballot packet will be sent to you.

VOTING & CORRECTING YOUR BALLOT

If you make an error on your ballot, spoil it in any way, or lose it, you may obtain a replacement ballot by contacting the Yamhill County Clerk's Office at 503-434-7518.

RETURNING YOUR VOTED BALLOT

- Follow the instructions on the secrecy sleeve
- Fold your ballot along the pre-scored fold and insert it into the optional secrecy sleeve, if desired
- Insert ballot (or ballot and secrecy sleeve) in the blue-trimmed return envelope
- **SEAL** the blue-trimmed return envelope and **SIGN** the statement on the back of the envelope
- Mail or place the return envelope in an Official Ballot Drop Box
- Your ballot will not be counted if your return envelope is not signed

**Explanatory Statement
Measure 36-192**

Measure Proposing Sale of Bonds for Public Safety Facility Construction

Question: Shall the City of Carlton issue general obligation bonds not exceeding \$2,300,000.00 for construction of a Public Safety Facility? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Summary: If approved, this measure will fund the construction of a Public Safety Building. The bonds will pay for:

- Demolition of the existing commercial building located on the site;
- Construction of a new public safety structure for the police department;
- Installation of mechanical, plumbing, and electrical improvements;
- Construction of secure prisoner processing and interview facilities; and,
- Design and engineering costs and bond issuance costs.

The bonds would mature in 26 years or less from date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series. The overall tax rate for these bonds is estimated to be approximately \$0.96 per \$1,000.00 of assessed property value the first year and average \$0.69 per \$1,000.00 of assessed property value over the life of the bond, or \$144.00 per \$150,000.00 of assessed valuation the first year and \$103.50 per \$150,000.00 of assessed valuation on average over the life of the bond. Actual rates may differ and depend upon interest rates incurred and growth in assessed valuation.

The Carlton Police Department currently occupies the west two rooms of the Carlton City Hall built in 1974. The building has limited space to house the police department and does not comply with existing building code standards. The building does not have an area for secure prisoner processing or interviewing, a private victim interview room, or officer restroom and shower facilities. There is no biohazard decontamination area. The existing officer locker room is located in an outbuilding with a roof that leaks, has no temperature control, and limited storage. The current building has limited office space for staff. The current building does not meet current building codes in regard to withstanding a natural disaster or earthquake.

The Carlton City Council established a citizen advisory committee to consider options and make recommendations about the project and funding options. The citizen advisory committee recommended referring a General Obligation Bond to the ballot for consideration by the voters. The City Council approved a resolution to place a measure on the May 15, 2018, ballot seeking authorization to issue general obligation bonds up to \$2,300,000.00 to construct a new public safety building to replace the existing one at the current site including secure detainee processing areas; a secure interview room; secure armory and evidence storage; a meeting room; office space; storage; a secure vehicle bay for one police vehicle; a locker room; and all necessary mechanical, plumbing, and electrical improvements.

If approved, this measure will provide up to \$2,300,000 to fund the construction of a Public Safety Building. The bonds will pay for:

- Demolition of the existing commercial building located on the site;
- Construction of a new public safety structure for the police department;
- Installation of mechanical, plumbing, and electrical improvements;
- Construction of secure prisoner processing and interview facilities; and,
- Design and engineering costs and bond issuance costs.

The bonds would mature in 26 years or less from date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series. WHY IS THE BOND MEASURE NEEDED NOW?

City Hall is nearly 45 years old, and Carlton's population has doubled since it was built. The structure has limited functionality, is too small for today's needs and is ill-equipped for modern law enforcement activities. Carlton is the fastest growing city in Yamhill County, with more growth expected. Demands on Police and City Government are increasing, as more people come here to live, visit, do business and travel through our City.

- Each month, Carlton Police interview or talk with an average of 30 individuals in their office area, including crime victims, witnesses, suspects and the general public. These interactions can expose Officers, the City and the community to undue risk and liability, given the lack of secure facilities to conduct Police business safely and confidentially. Left unaddressed, these sub-standard working conditions could result in someone being placed in harm's way.
- Two outstanding Bonds will be fully paid off in 2021 and 2026. **The property tax impact from the 2021 Bond is currently greater than the projected cost of this Public Safety Bond.** As the old two Bonds expire, Carlton property taxes will decline, even with the addition of the new Public Safety Bond.
- With interest rates near historical lows, this project can be financed at favorable borrowing costs. Building materials, labor costs, and interest rates are all projected to rise in future years, which could quickly put this project out of reach. **Time is of the essence.**

Let's keep Carlton safe for our residents, businesses and visitors. Your vote insures a secure Carlton community for today and for years to come.

Measure 36-192 Argument in Support

Carlton's City Hall was built out of cinderblocks in 1974 and is not ADA compliant, nor does it meet current building codes for seismic compliance (earthquakes). Carlton's Police Department occupies two small rooms in City Hall and uses several old outbuildings nearby. The Police Department's work areas are not secure and are deficient in many respects. The current environment does not support the requirements of a modern law enforcement operation.

In late 2016, the City Hall/Public Safety Citizens Advisory Committee was appointed to work with City Staff on facility options for the Police Department and General Government operations. The Committee considered multiple new construction and remodel alternatives, and costs were higher than anticipated. **The Police Department was determined to be the highest priority need, based on its significant security issues, limited space, workplace deficiencies and the overall importance placed on Carlton's public safety.**

The Police Department is funded by the City's General Fund, and all police expenses must be paid for exclusively by the General Fund. The financial analysis demonstrated that the General Fund could not cover this capital project, even if all other General Fund projects were eliminated. The Committee recommended that a General Obligation Bond Measure, to construct a Public Safety Facility, be referred to Carlton's voters for consideration.

On November 7, 2017, City Council passed Resolution 2017-252, proposing the sale of General Obligation Bonds to construct a Public Safety Facility, and referring Bond Measure #36-192 to Carlton voters for the May 15, 2018 election.

Carlton City Council believes that a safe, secure and efficient Police Department Facility is of critical importance to Carlton's citizens. We urge all registered voters to participate in this election, and we encourage a "YES" vote to improve our public safety capabilities.

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City of Lafayette

Referred by the City of Lafayette Measure 36-195

Construction of intertie to expand water supply to the City

Question: Should Lafayette construct an intertie with McMinnville Water & Light to increase the available water supply to the City?

Summary: The purpose of this intertie project is to provide Lafayette an additional water supply to meet current and future growth demands. Approval of this ballot measure will allow the City to use existing revenue projections and possible state support to construct an estimated 8,800 feet of 12" waterline and pump station from Lafayette to McMinnville. The proposed intertie will provide adequate water supply during high summer demand periods and will eliminate water supply shortages that have occurred in the past. In addition, this intertie will provide the water resources to allow future development in the City's urban growth boundary. Construction of this estimated \$2.5 million intertie project is included in the Water System Capital Improvement Plan. The Lafayette City Charter requires voter approval for any capital project of \$1 million or more. Approval of this ballot measure does not increase property taxes.

City of Lafayette

Explanatory Statement Measure 36-195

This measure would approve the construction of an estimated 8,800 feet of 12" waterline from the terminus of the McMinnville water main on Loop Road to connect to the City of Lafayette water system. Included in the project will be the construction of a master water meter, pump station, backflow preventer, and if needed a booster system for PH and chlorine adjustment.

This intertie will allow the City to access to up to 500 gallons of water per minute to add to the capacity of the existing City water system to meet current and future growth demands. The proposed intertie will provide additional water supply during high summer demand periods and will eliminate water supply shortages that have occurred in the past. This intertie will provide sufficient water resources to allow future development within the City's urban growth boundary. Construction of this intertie facility is called for in the Lafayette Water Master Plan, and is included in the City's Capital Improvement program.

This measure is not requesting any funding from citizens or any property tax increase to pay for this project. The Lafayette City Charter requires voter approval on any capital project above \$1 million, regardless of the funding source, which is why voter approval of this construction project is necessary even though there is no request for an increase in taxes or fees associated with this measure.

The water received from McMinnville Water & Light through the intertie will be purchased pursuant to a Water Supply Agreement. It is estimated that the initial cost for water purchased through the intertie will be \$2.50 per 100 cubic feet. The City has a 15-year projection for water utility and other funding streams to fund capital improvements, and the plan anticipates timely construction of the proposed intertie. The plan provides for incremental water rate increases over 15 years, not to exceed 4% annually. This funding plan will provide funding for necessary capital improvements and offset the cost of purchasing water provided from the intertie. The annual water rate adjustments are programmed to occur to fund capital investments regardless of the outcome of the vote on this measure.

The estimated cost for this intertie project is \$2.5 million, which will be paid from existing and future resources, system development fees and potentially state funding support. If approved, construction would begin in 2019 and be completed prior to the summer of 2020. Construction of this intertie is an integral component to the Water Supply Agreement to be entered into with McMinnville Water & Light, and the intertie will serve as a direct connection for access by the City to future regional water facilities.

In order to meet summer demands and to accommodate future investments in land development, this intertie project would provide additional water supply to Lafayette customers.

City Charter Amendment relating fees for new and added development.

Question: Shall the City Charter be amended to allow annual increases in certain development fees in accordance with State Law?

Summary: The purpose of the proposed Charter amendment is to allow annual increases in public facility fees payable to the City by developers based on a cost of construction index.

The City Council has proposed a new Section 51 of the City Charter to implement Oregon Revised Statute 223.304(8). State law authorizes adjustment of certain development charges based upon an adopted construction cost index. The proposed new section would read as follows:

"SECTION 51. CHARGES TO DEVELOPERS FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

In accordance with Oregon Revised Statute 223.304(8) and any replacement statute, and notwithstanding any other provision of this City Charter, system development charges payable to the City for expansion or replacement of public facilities may be increased annually based upon a cost of construction index designated by the City Council. An annual increase may be calculated to conform to a ten-year average of annual changes in such building cost index."

City of Sheridan

Explanatory Statement Measure 36-194

The purpose of the proposed Charter amendment is to allow annual increases in public facility fees payable to the City by developers based on a cost of construction index.

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In accordance with Oregon Revised Statute 223.304(8) and any replacement statute, and notwithstanding any other provision of this City Charter, system development charges payable to the City for expansion or replacement of public facilities may be increased annually based upon a cost of construction index designated by the City Council. An annual increase may be calculated to conform to a ten-year average of annual changes in such building cost index."

System development charges are payable on new development that is constructed within the City of Sheridan. System development charges contribute to or reimburse the city for existing public facilities that will be committed to the new development. Oregon law permits cities to partially finance new facilities or reimburse the cost of existing facilities by charging system development charges for new development that will increase useage of public water, sewer, street, park and other public facilities.

If passed, this Charter amendment would permit adjustment by the City Council of system development charges based on changes in a construction cost index.

If the Charter Amendment does not pass the City Council will not have authority to make changes in the amounts of system development charges based on changes in a construction cost index.

Nestucca Valley School District

Referred by Nestucca Valley School District Measure 29-153

Authorizes General Obligation Bonds to Construct and Renovate School Facilities

Question: Shall Nestucca School District issue \$25,700,000 general obligation bonds for capital costs, renovate and expand elementary facilities, receive \$4,000,000 grant? If the bonds are approved, they will be payable from taxes on property or property ownership that are not subject to the limits of sections 11 and 11b, Article XI of the Oregon Constitution.

Summary: Nestucca Valley School District No. 101 has been awarded \$4,000,000 in State grants which will be available only if the bonds are approved.

If approved, this measure would finance capital costs, including:

- Renovate existing elementary facilities: plumbing, electrical, windows, siding and finishes.
- Construct addition to elementary facilities increasing the capacity to move 7th and 8th graders out of the JRSR High School to a K-8 campus. The construction will include: new cafeteria, commons, classrooms, regulation-size gymnasium, parking facility, playground, landscaping and other improvements with energy efficient, seismic, safety and security design.
- Facilities may serve as emergency shelter for area residents following a natural disaster.
- Renovate K-8 water system, purchase property and other capital improvements to District facilities.
- Pay issuance costs.

Bonds would mature in 21 years or less from date(s) of issuance. If approved, the incremental tax rate increase from the projected 2019 rate is estimated to be \$0.99 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value. Actual rates may vary based upon interest rates incurred and changes in assessed value.

Nestucca Valley School District

Explanatory Statement Measure 29-153

Nestucca Valley School District has placed a construction bond on the May 2018 ballot. If approved, this bond would provide funds to make capital improvements to District facilities.

Passage of this bond allows Nestucca Valley School District to receive an Oregon School Capital Improvement Matching Program Grant award for \$4,000,000.

Nestucca Valley School District's Long Range Facilities Planning Committee, comprised of community members, parents, and staff reviewed data on the District's existing facilities, examined enrollment projections, discussed changes on how education is delivered and gathered input from the community to create a facilities improvement plan. Guided by this plan, if approved, the bond funds would be used to:

- Create a K-8 Campus. Build new classrooms, commons, a cafeteria, media commons, gymnasium, and other site upgrades.
- Safety Improvements. On-site parking and circulation would be expanded to provide a more streamlined point of entry and exit. Doors and security systems would receive upgrades for continued safety.
- Support Existing Infrastructure. Replacements and upgrades to the existing plumbing, electrical, windows, siding and building finishes.
- Expanded Community Use. Construction of a second gymnasium for use by drama, music, sports and other programs at District schools. Expanded common space, media center, and gym.
- Regain High School Capacity. Nestucca Junior Senior High School would regain space for the existing students by shifting grades 7-8 to the K-8 campus. Nestucca Junior Senior High School would be used as designed to meet the education needs of grades 9-12.
- Renovate K-8 Water System. The elementary school's water system would be upgraded to improve drinking water and eliminate the current need to provide bottled water to students and staff.
- Property purchase and other capital improvements to district facilities.
- Pay bond issuance costs.

What would the bond cost?

If approved, the incremental tax rate increase from the projected 2019 rate is estimated to be \$0.99 per \$1,000.00 of assessed value. Actual rates may vary based upon interest rates incurred and changes in assessed value.

The bonds would mature in 21 years or less from their date of issuance and may be issued in one or more series.

The District would appoint a citizen's bond oversight committee to assure funds from the bonds are used as approved by the voters.

West Valley Fire District

Referred by West Valley Fire District Measure 36-193

Five Year Local Option Tax for District Operations, Capital Projects.

Question: Shall the district levy \$.50 per \$1000 each year for 5 years beginning 2018 for basic operations? This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than 3 percent.

Summary: The district needs additional funds to maintain current levels of service and basic operation. This local option tax measure would begin in fiscal year 2018 - 2019.

The Board of Directors have determined that a need exists to replace all Self Contained Breathing Apparatus in the fire district since they will be out of the service life in under 2 years, replace minimally one ambulance due to aging and high mileage, invest in maintenance and updating of the main station in Willamina, improve the training grounds and props for the training of firefighters and to help sustain the award winning Community Paramedic Program while service contracts are developed.

Proposed rate is estimated as follows: \$134,826.39 in 2018 - 2019; \$138,871.18 in 2019 - 2020; \$143,037.32 in 2020 - 2021; \$147,328.44 in 2021 - 2022; and \$151,748.29 in 2022 - 2023.

West Valley Fire District

Explanatory Statement Measure 36-193

West Valley Fire District provides firefighting, emergency medical services, fire prevention, emergency planning and management to all the residents of our 90 square mile response area. With funding from your tax dollars, ambulance billing, grants, and contracts, we have worked to provide professional, reliable and sustainable services. As our community has grown and the types of services have changed over the years, the District has worked to add personnel, equipment and training in order to be prepared. The fire district has been a good steward of the tax dollars entrusted to us; the last time we asked for additional funding was for a bond to build a new fire station in Willamina 19 years ago.

The West Valley Fire District has been able to keep up with most of the rising costs of operations until now. Ambulance reimbursement rates have been cut by the federal government each year for the last several years, even as the real costs of providing those services have gone up. Since the changes in health care regulations in 2013, we have seen the ambulance billing reimbursement rate decline from 53% to 37%. Additionally, in 1996, Oregon voters approved Ballot Measures 47 and 50. The ballot measures rolled back the valuation of local properties to 90% of the 1995-96 value, and then capped any budget increases at 3% annually. These two cuts are beyond our control but drain needed funds from our operations.

Funds provided by this 5 year levy will help sustain support for personnel, support community outreach, as well as purchase or update essential facilities and equipment. This will include replacement of our Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). Within the next two years, 80% of our SCBAs will be out of their service life and, with replacement parts no longer being made they will no longer comply with current safety standards and will be unusable for firefighters at structure fires. Updating is also needed for the interior/exterior of the fire station and the parking lot. One ambulance needs to be replaced due to age and mileage. And, finally, the levy will provide gap funding while service contracts are being developed to sustain our award winning Community Paramedic Program that has helped improve health and wellness, reduce re-hospitalizations and connect people to needed resources in our community.

Your "Yes" vote will help provide the necessary funds to allow us to continue providing quality, innovative and cost effective emergency services 24/7 to the communities of Willamina, Grand Ronde and The Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde. - You are a resident of Oregon

YOU MUST RE-REGISTER TO VOTE IF:

- Your residence or mailing address changes
- Your name changes
- You wish to change party affiliation

VOTING INSTRUCTIONS

When you receive your ballot packet in the mail, immediately examine it to make certain it is complete. It should contain the following items:

- A printed ballot on which you may vote your choice
- A secrecy sleeve with voting instructions printed on it
- A pre-addressed blue-trimmed return envelope in which to return your ballot

If any items are missing, contact the Yamhill County Clerk's Office, at 503-434-7518 (or 503-554-7850 from Newberg), and a replacement ballot packet will be sent to you.

VOTING & CORRECTING YOUR BALLOT





Precinct Committee People

What is a Precinct Committeeperson?

If you are a member of the Democratic or Republican party, you will receive a ballot with “Precinct Committeepersons” on it.

- These are men and women who represent their political party in each precinct on a countywide “Central Committee” (an equal number of both per precinct).
- Precinct Committee People help set the party agenda and party platform.
- They act as directors of the local party Central Committee, attend meetings of the committee, help candidates run for office, and conduct the business of the party.
- Central Committees elect people to represent the county at the state level, and those members select the representatives to the national committees.
- They also help select replacements for vacated state offices (Oregon House or Senate offices).

Voting for Precinct Committeepersons (PCPs):

To qualify as a Precinct Committeeperson (PCP), one must have lived in the county and have been registered in their political party for at least 180 days prior to the Primary Election. A person can represent the precinct in which they live or an adjacent precinct (within the same county). They serve a two-year term.

A Committeeperson of each sex is elected in each precinct for every 500 voters (or major part thereof) that are registered in the precinct as of January 31st. There is a list showing the positions available as well as a list of current position holders from both parties on our website’s “Precincts & PCPs” page:



Your ballot will indicate how many offices are available in your precinct. For instance, it would say “Vote For Six” if there are six offices available for your precinct (in this case there would be six female and six male positions). If you are not registered as a Democrat or Republican, Precinct Committeepersons will not appear on your ballot.

- You **do not have to vote** for any PCPs (yes, the rest of your votes will still count).
- You do not have to complete each available position if you do not want to.
- Where a candidate has filed, mark your selection like any other race.
- If you want to write in a name that is not on the ballot, fill the box next to “Write-in”, then neatly write the person’s name of your choice on the line provided.

- A “write-in” candidate must receive at least 3 (three) votes from members of their party from within that precinct to be elected.

- We encourage you to write-in only those names of people you know want to serve and who live in your precinct or an adjacent one.
