Trail hearing delay requested

The county has rejected a request by the Yamhill County Farm Bureau and some farmers to delay a remote April 30 hearing on the Yamhelas Westsider Trail.

The hearing is to consider a remand by the state Land Use Board of Appeals requiring the county to address practical details of how it would prevent the trail from impacting adjacent farms.

The proposed trail would run from north of Gun Club Road between McMinnville and Carlton to Gaston along a former stretch of Union Pacific Railroad the county bought in 2017. It is intended as a path for walking, bicycling and horseback riding.

To comply with state orders for people to stay home, the county has asked all testimony for the April 30 hearing be submitted in writing in advance. The hearing will be livestreamed over YouTube, and commissioners will discuss the written testimony they received.

The farm bureau, and some farmers, argued the issue should be tabled until the county can hold in-person hearings or allow remote oral testimony.

“Other public bodies regularly take live testimony via available online video tools,” the Farm Bureau said in a news release.

“The busiest time of the year for many area farmers, and at the height of a global pandemic, is not the time to be rushing a process like this,” Yamhill County Farm Bureau President Jerry Mann said in the release. “Cobbling together a last-minute YouTube show with no chance for live testimony is not the way to run a credible public comment process.”

County Planning Director Ken Friday told commissioners Thursday that the county previously had accepted only written testimony for remand hearings which had experienced multiple previous hearings, such as that for a proposed expansion of Riverbend Landfill.

“In this case, the trail has had five hearings, with, if I remember correctly, the last two before the board being hearings of four and six hours in length,” Friday told commissioners.

Given that history and the fact that both sides would face the same restrictions, Friday said he was comfortable with maintaining the April 30 hearing.

“I want this to be fair. I want the sides to feel like they’ve been heard,” Friday said.

As the county is the applicant, it can also decide on its own to postpone the hearing, he said.

Commissioners said they want to hold the hearing and then decide whether they need more time to consider the comments, or seek additional testimony.
